1 The BFG in Roald Dahl's 'The BFG'

In the moonlight, Sophie caught a glimpse of an enormous long pale wrinkly face with the most enormous ears. The nose was as sharp as a knife, and above the nose there were two bright flashing eyes, and the eyes were staring straight at Sophie. There was a fierce and devilish look about them.

2 Anne in Lucy M's 'Anne of Green Gables'
"You don't want me!" she cried. "You don't want me
because I'm not a boy! I might have expected it. Nobody
ever did want me. I might have known it was all too
beautiful to last. I might have known nobody really did want
me. Oh, what shall I do? I'm going to burst into tears!"
Burst into tears she did. Sitting down on a chair by the
table, flinging her arms out upon it, and burying her face in
them, she proceeded to cry stormily.

3 Percy in Rick Riordan's 'Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief'
Don't say | didn't warn you.

My name is Percy Jackson.

I'm twelve years old. Until a few months ago, I was a boarding student at Yancy Academy, a private school for troubled kids in upstate New York.

Am I a troubled kid?

Yeah. You could say that.

When a writer uses the 1st person, we get to journey inside the main character's head, heart, and body.

4 Scrooge in Charles Dickens' 'A Christmas Carol'
Oh! But he was a tight-fisted hand at the grindstone,
Scrooge! A squeezing, wrenching, grasping, scraping,
clutching, covetous old sinner! Hard and sharp as flint, from
which no steel had ever struck out generous fire; secret and
self contained and solitary as an oyster. The cold within him
froze his old features, nipped his pointed nose, shrivelled his
cheek, stiffened his gait; made his eyes red, his thin lips blue;
and spoke out shrewdly in his grating voice.

Look how Dickens uses adjectives to do with coldness & hardness to describe Scrooge's personality.

5 Jack in William Golding's 'Lord of the Flies'
...he was thin and bony; and his hair was red beneath the
black cap. His face was crumpled and freckled, and ugly
without silliness. Out of this face stared two light blue eyes,
frustrated now, and turning, or ready to turn, to anger.

Look at how William Golding uses colour to create a vivid character description.



Lord Asriel in Philip Pullman's 'The Golden Compass'
Lord Asriel was a tall man with powerful shoulders, a fierce
dark face, and eyes that seemed to flash and glitter with
savage laughter. It was a face to be dominated by, or to
fight: never a face to patronize or pity. All his movements
were large and perfectly balanced, like those of a wild
animal, and when he appeared in a room like this, he seemed
a wild animal held in a cage too small for it
